How to Summon a Community Service Officer on Campus/Westwood Village

15 minutes before you need to leave, call (310) 794-WALK. You will be connected to a police dispatcher who will ask you:

- 1. Where you are,
- 2. Where you need to go, and
- 3. Your name and a call-back number.

After you hang up, the dispatcher will radio a roaming CSO to come to your location and pick you up.

Dates/Hours of Service – 365 days per year, dusk until 1:00am

For Immediate Emergencies: Call 911

For each call received, a public safety dispatcher will ask a series of structured questions while a second dispatcher will be sending the appropriate assistance to your location. Listen carefully to each question and try to answer it as best you can.

- Give a brief description of what occurred.
- Where exactly did the incident occur? Include building and room/area.
- Then give a detailed description of the events that occurred.
- How long ago did the incident occur?
- Did the suspect(s) have any weapons?
- Where and when was the suspect last seen?



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- Which direction was the suspect headed?
- Was the suspect on foot or in a vehicle?
- What did the suspect(s) look like? Describe each suspect one at a time.
- Gender
- Race
- Age
- Height & Weight
- Hair Color & Length
- Clothing
- Glasses/Facial Hair
- Was the suspect carrying anything?
- Vehicle Description, Color, Make, Model, License Plate, direction of travel

- 24-Hour Hotline. Crisis intervention, information and referrals, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. This is the entry point to all of Sojourn's services.
- The Crisis Shelter offers 4-6 weeks of housing, support and case management in a secure location. Adams House is a second-stage shelter for individuals and families who need extra time in a supportive setting to regroup and recover. A typical stay may be as little as three or as many as six months.
- Children's Program. Empowerment-based, clinical art/play therapy, assistance with school enrollment, tutoring, and non-violent parenting skills workshops.
- Community Education, Outreach and Prevention. Educational presentations on teen dating
 violence, healthy relationships, and non-violent negotiation skills to children, teenagers, and
 youth. Training, technical assistance, and awareness programs for the community. BRO, a citywide collaborative to prevent violence by deconstructing traditional notions of masculinity.
 Teen Education in Liberation Arts (TELA), an education and activism program for local school
 youth.
- Court Advocacy and Legal Assistance. Pro bono weekly clinic for victims. Volunteer attorneys
 answer basic legal questions regarding divorce, child custody and visitation, property, and
 landlord/tenant issues. Safety assessment, crisis intervention, court accompaniment and
 referrals to community resources are provided to victims at the office of the Santa Monica City
 Attorney.
- Support Groups. Various days/times, drop-in basis. Simultaneous empowerment play groups for children.
- DV 101: Knowledge=Power. For survivors only, classes on DV dynamics, parenting, and healthy boundaries. Satisfies court and DCFS requirements for "domestic violence classes."
